Part of it was our fault, and part of it was ignorance to how poor our conditions were. Of the 20 that made it to the first frost, only 10 gave us a bloom, BUT we were hooked!!! The next year, using our horrible success rate we planted 200 tubers hoping to have 70 "make it", we had about 100 make it. Realizing some of our failure was due to planting plants out the day before a two week heat wave/drought coupled with our poor growing conditions I committed to MASSIVELY overhauling, for the better, our dirt in an attempt to make soil.



Because my daughter is involved in this endeavor, I NEVER wanted her to be in contact our around harsh chemicals so this entire journey has been 100% organic for us. It was my commitment to organics and my love of all things sporting that tightly connected Tony Evangelista. He was 100% supportive of my efforts to create our own compost and shift towards no-till, and it was at the Columbus show this Summer where he had chance to see Quinn and I's blooms in person that reflected all our efforts. This was a dahlia season Quinn and I will never forget!!! It was a roller coaster of being SO surprised with the drastic improvement in the quality of our blooms, the overall exceptional health of our plants, the fun we had and all the shows we attended, the amazing new friendships we formed especially with Jason Fairchild and all the Westfalls!!!! It also will be a year that has left a very large hole in all of our hearts with the loss of a VERY special person to all of us. It seems like yesterday that Quinn skipped a day of school in the Spring to join me as we brought dirt from Tony's Painesville garden down to his new Delaware garden . . . Our family will always maintain our membership with the GCDS and we hope to attend your show every year as a tribute to our friend Tony, and look forward to meeting more of your members.


#### **Jeanette Enyart, Saint Paris**


Dahlias supported with wood dowels getting ready for transport to a show. Notice the salt and watermelon rinds – signs of summer!
























### **Stephanie Homorody, Lewis Center**

### Jeff & Linda Laine, Westerville










### Lisa Leist, Blacklick


### John Wheatley, Worthington



























# **Steve Walker, Columbus**
